Evidence and evaluation Short description on <u>performance</u> <u>measures</u> of the practice, including	Attendees are more able to identify incidents of violent extremism in prisons. They are more sensitive to the first signs of the radicalisation process, and also know who to contact if they have concerns about certain inmates etc. One challenge has been the rather long training blocks. Certain topics have to be explained in depth as many participants have no prior knowledge. The course has an evaluation component that includes a questionnaire focused not only on the evaluation of the course itself, but also the lecturers and the course material. The course is evaluated internally after each session. It has been evaluated seven times since June 2017. The most important findings are the demand for further increasing knowledge about extremism and radicalisation, and the importance of highlighting experiences from other countries. The need for a handbook as an analytical tool for use inside prisons has also become clear. By August 2018, 11 courses have been delivered to over 450 participants. The feedback from participants and the management of Prison Service has been all positive.
