It aims to prevent online extremism and radicalisation that threatens young people's welfare and rights. The overall objective is to build societal resilience by increasing the capacity of youth workers to counter and prevent radicalisation in youth. The main aim of the project is training youth workers and other professionals working with young people on the issue of violent radicalisation and extremism. The purpose of the trainings is to increase understanding on the phenomenon and its possible manifestations and introduce tools to enable dialogue on the subject. Furthermore, these trainings aim to convey the idea of youth work being key in preventing violent radicalisation. In addition to these day-long trainings, the project will organise in-depth workshops on key issues based on feedback from the trainings. Additionally, the project conducts research on how violent extremism and radicalisation manifest online. The project aims to increase understanding on the manifestation and spread of extremism in Finnish online environments. A pilot training was conducted at the end of 2018. A pilot project was carried out in 2019, and the current phase is ongoing (2020-2022).

Additionally, two reports will be published on the subject. One report on radicalisation in Finnish online environments, particularly far-right extremism, was published in early 2020. The report was completed during the pilot phase in 2019 and can be found in English online (https://pelastakaalapset.s3.eu-west- 1.amazonaws.com/main/2019/03/31162948/StCF_Viol ent_Extremism_online.pdf). Published in September 2021, the second report explored how extremist groups recruit young people, with a focus on online environments. - Overall, the 15 trainings conducted have received positive feedback from participants. Demand for these trainings has been high. All training and workshop sessions will be followed up with feedback forms. Additionally, the project is internally monitored according to Save the Children Finland KPIs and strategy aims.
- The project is included in the Finnish National Action Plan for the Prevention of Violent Radicalisation and Extremism 2019-2023 as well as the national working group that oversees its implementation. The project is still ongoing, and as such, an evaluation has not been carried out. Additionally, a formal evaluation is not required by the funder.
- 3. The project was presented at a RAN LOCAL meeting in September 2020. Overall, the project received positive feedback from the meeting participants. The project is currently being reviewed by an expert. It may be included in the RAN best practice database.

The practices of the RadicalWeb project are easily transferrable to different contexts. The content of the trainings can be localised and modified to fit local challenges and issues. Depending on the training youth workers receive in their respective countries, the content of the training and workshops can be adjusted to correspond to their skill set and knowledge.

Due to the current situation with COVID-19, the cost of running these trainings is low as they are conducted on online platforms. Furthermore, this has the potential to reach more people than would have been possible had the trainings been done face-to-face. Otherwise, travel as well as space bookings, etc. would increase the cost of running these trainings and workshops.

Other costs of the project include host platforms for the online training module as well as a crawler search engine to conduct research.
