Another important objective is to develop working methods for use with community violence offenders. Aggredi's client work is structured and therapeutically oriented. It is based on theories on labelling and social constructionism from a perspective of desistance. Working methods are based on dialogical and reflective discussions. Aggredi's work is impartial: individuals meet with workers (no group meetings), and the services are open to all offenders, regardless of their political, ideological, or religious backgrounds. The clients consist mainly of community violence offenders between the ages of 18 and 49 (between 18 and 65 in Pori). Clients also include: those planning school or mass killings gang members and their families (organised crime EXIT), right wing-orientated perpetrators offenders across the spectrum of religious extremism
