Establish a common set of definitions to be used by all professionals

Share uncertainties with fellow colleagues, management and/or other experts



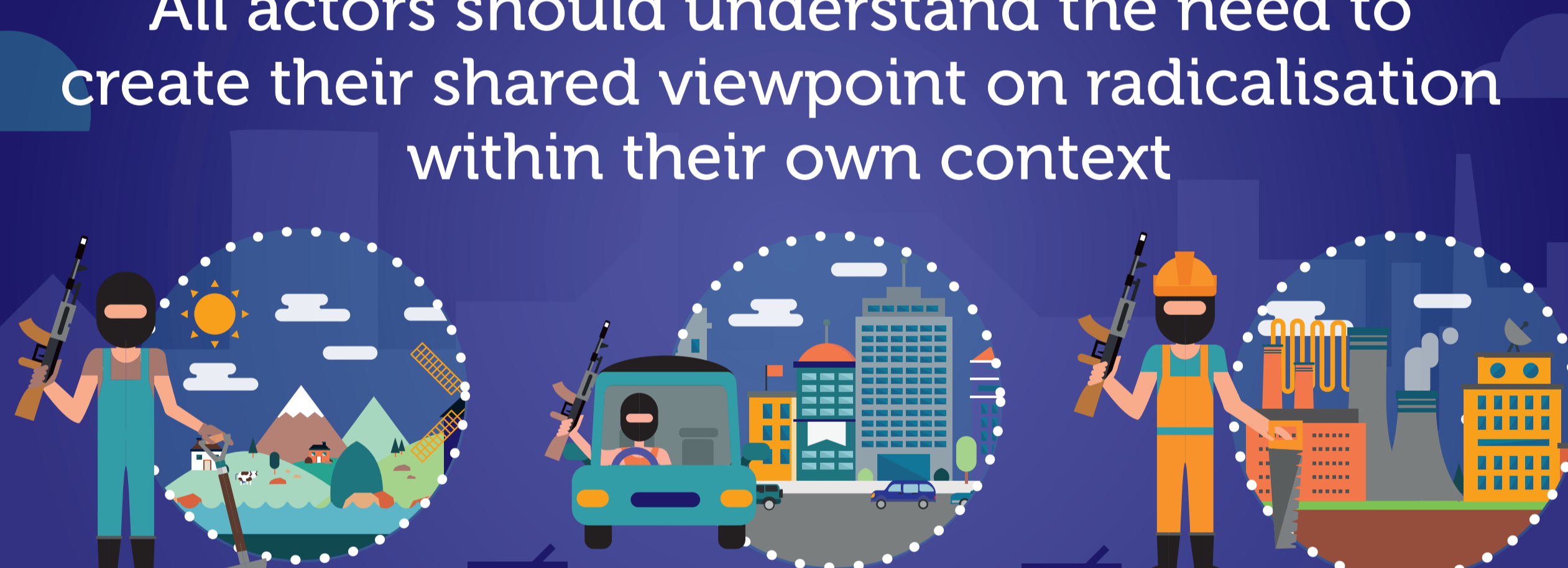
Lesson 6
